Ida B. Wells was an African American journalist, abolitionist and feminist who led an anti-lynching crusade in the United States in the 1890s. She went on to found and become integral in groups striving for African American justice and women's suffrage. She co-founded the National Association of Colored Women (NACW) in 1896.



Dr. Bob Livingston will present Ida Wells' story at our May meeting. Dr. Livingston has a doctorate from UCLA, and was a social studies teacher for LAUSD for 32 years. After his retirement, he turned to writing historical fiction, and has done extensive research on Ida Wells.
