

# Searching for Augusta Savage

We will be viewing the short documentary film *Searching for Augusta Savage* and speaking with its producer. Who was Augusta Savage, and why is she important?

Augusta Savage (1892-1962) was an artist, and the first person in the U.S. to open a gallery dedicated to African American art. A Harlem Renaissance sculptor and art educator, she was also one of the first Black women art activists of her time and fought for the inclusion of Black artists in the mainstream canon. In the documentary, art historian Jeffree M. Hayes, Ph.D., explores Savage's legacy and why her artwork has been largely erased from mainstream historical narratives.
